SARAH GARDNER

Sarah Gardner, previously of the University of Reading Community Team, was a key collaborator with University Arts Strategy Team, to bring this project together.

We asked her about her motivations for investing in this project, and her hopes for the project.

Why did the Community Team invested in this work?

The Sounds of Nature project was a creative and exciting way to promote the Harris Gardens as a free resource to community groups in Reading. Lots of people who do not study or work at the University have no idea of the amazing resources on campus, including the green space. This was something the Community team heard time and again - people did not know what was available or did not feel welcome or 'allowed' to use the campus. The Harris Gardens are one of the most beautiful spaces with huge historical and scientific value that it seemed important to introduce it to as many people as possible, particularly young people and marginalised communities.

What were your hopes for the project?

My main hope was that people who did not usually use the campus or feel welcome on campus would discover this delightful space and tell all their friends and family about it. The project was conceived prior to the pandemic but this hope became even more precious as we were forced to realise how necessary access to nature is. My other hope was that we would share the history of the botanical gardens amongst people in an accessible and innovative way - telling the story of the plants in a way which would inspire future botanists or nature-lovers.

It was a key aim of the Community team that students were empowered to work with Reading-based communities and act as ambassadors for the University. The students played a really key role in this project with their huge enthusiasm, passion and interest. Quite a few had also never heard of the Harris Gardens so it was as much a discovery for them as for the schools and community groups they worked with. We couldn't have delivered this work without them.

STÉPHANIE MICHELL

Stéphanie Mitchell is a project manager and consultant specialising in supporting artists, creative practitioners and cultural leaders to plan and deliver their creative projects. She also works with different community groups as an organiser. She sometimes operates under the name <u>we</u> like detail.



Previously Stéph supported the planning and delivery of commissions and multi-artist, multi-venue exhibitions, workshops and performances for Reading International, a contemporary art organisation based in Reading, England.

Before that, as Head of Production at Doc Society, a social justice documentary film foundation, Stéph ran their worldwide events programme at such venues as New York Times Center, New World Center in Miami, and the Oslo Opera House, Norway. Stéph has also worked with the Independent Cinema Office, the UK Film Council, and run an international film festival in the North East of England that included a 100-strong film programme, industry summit and education programme.
