## DECADENT FEMINISM: 'NEW WOMAN' WRITERS IN THE ARCHIVES

## INTRODUCTION

The 'New Woman' era emerged in the 1890s, including authors such as Sarah Grand, E. Nesbit, Michael Field, Alice Meynell, George Egerton, and some less renowned writers such as 'Lucilla', Alice Edwardes, and Emily Hickey. Many of these authors have unfortunately faded into obscurity, but luckily their books remain. Titles include Field's *Attila My Attila*, Grand's *The Heavenly Twins*, Vernon Lee's *Vanitas: Polite Stories*, Egerton's *Discords*, and Anodos' (Mary E. Coleridge) *Fancy's Guerdon*. In 1894, Sarah Grand wrote her essay 'The New Aspect of the Woman Question', and promptly gave a name to the movement.

New Woman writing as a genre is harder to pin down, especially as it is an endogenous category, meaning that it was named within the era by its contemporaries, and so different writers had different opinions on what *made* a New Woman. However, most works incorporated social commentary, often from a pre-suffrage feminist or socialist angle. This stirred up controversy in late Victorian Britain, as New Woman writers were going to university, lobbying for sexual and political autonomy, and generally, as Carolyn Christensen Nelson says, 'arguing that the separate spheres [for men and women] was a construct of society and culture rather than a biological mandate...[and demanding] that women be given the same opportunities and choices as men'.¹ Following legal reform, women were allowed to retain property after marriage, and hence were becoming increasingly capable of living without the necessity of marriage. For example, the two authors that were Michael Field, Katherine Bradley and Edith Cooper, lived together as a lesbian couple on inherited money from Bradley's father.

The New Woman engaged with the *fin de siècle* movements like Decadence and Aestheticism. Decadents such as Oscar Wilde and Aubrey Beardsley ran in the same literary circles as some New Women, like Vernon Lee (aka Violet Paget), George Egerton (aka Mary Chavelita Dunne) and Ella D'Arcy. The Decadents' commitment to shocking the middle class with their scandalous writings and lifestyles matched the New Women's, who sought to challenge tradition, and opened discussions about women's suffrage and sexual autonomy. Some women sent their works into decadent publications such as the *The Yellow Book*. Its publishers, John Lane and Elkin Mathews, welcomed submissions from women writers, and published many New Woman works.

Grand, in her essay 'The New Aspect of the Woman Question' (1894), describes the New Woman as in 'silent contemplation... she solved the problem and proclaimed for herself what was wrong'. She blames men for berating women, and chastises women for their supposed meek submission to patriarchal society. While Grand does not say much about the qualities of a New Woman, she certainly paints a picture of a motherly, intellectually superior woman. In her novels, the female

characters were often autonomous, such as Evadne in 'The Heavenly Twins' (1893), who effectively disowns her husband after finding out he has syphilis from illicit sexual activity prior to their marriage.

Ouida, aka Maria Louise Ramé, wrote an article criticising the New Woman and her refusal to disclose the 'remedy' for women's suffering. She pokes fun at Grand's idea that women 'graciously refrained from preventing' men's mishandling of the world, suggesting that the irony does not occur to the New Woman. Instead of the 'overweening and unreasonable grasping at...positions [of power]', Ouida proposes that the New Woman focus on the 'immense fields of culture untilled'. She argues that women can pursue any sort of artistic endeavour they choose to, without needing to 'steal' men's techniques. She calls the New Woman vain and overestimated in her own value. However, instead of providing any sort of counter to Grand's New Woman, and the advancement of women's emancipation, Ouida insists that women 'till' their own sphere in order to produce better children and society.

Charles Elkin Mathews (1851–1921) was a publisher and bookseller, who studied in Bath and London before establishing himself as a legitimate publisher in Exeter in 1884. In 1887, he moved back to London where he and John Lane (1854–1925) founded The Bodley Head. Bodley Head books garnered a particular meaning among the literary circles of London. As a small publisher, the company took on works from unknown and rebellious authors, who would not have been published otherwise. Bodley Head books were known for breaking with literary, social, and moral conventions. Mathews was more conservative in his choices of publications, but John Lane, as the more forceful of the two, convinced him to publish more controversial works. In 1894, the partnership collapsed, and Mathews returned to bookselling and publishing less outlandish works. In contrast, Lane made the company a welcoming space for daring works, including New Woman ones.

This catalogue contains many books from Mathew's own collection, the majority of which were published by his two companies. Some books are one of only 100 copies, and it is sobering to think that without the copies in the catalogue, some of these writers would have been totally forgotten. As the twentieth century progressed, fewer and fewer of the New Woman authors remained in print, and modernism delivered a mortal blow. Some authors, such as 'Lucilla', remain only a pseudonym, with nothing but their works to give any clue as to who they were. Others used their real names, such as Alice Edwardes, but their lives, too, have been lost to history.

Building this catalogue meant I had to decide what to include and what to exclude. I was not discriminatory as to genre, since the New Woman expressed her views on society just as strongly through poetry and non-fiction as she did in fictional prose. However, the window of time I worked within was more flexible, as the University's collections included New Woman *writers*, but not necessarily works by them that were published in the 1890s. Edith Nesbit's *Ballads & Lyrics of Socialism* was published in 1908 but included works by her that had been written during the New Woman period. John Oliver Hobbes (aka Pearl Mary Teresa Craigie) was another example; the only copies of her work that the University owned were published in 1905, though she wrote steadily throughout the 1890s. The New Woman movement spread beyond Britain, and there are some American, European, and South African (Olive Schreiner) authors who have contributed to this catalogue.

Further cataloguing work could be made; I believe there are probably more works by New Woman authors within the University's collections, perhaps by women using pseudonyms. The New Woman

herself is a character that existed in writings stretching back to the 1860s, and so works including a New Woman could be made into a sub-catalogue.

Though many have been lost to time, some New Woman works have survived and remain important up to today. E. Nesbit is still remembered for her children's stories, particularly for *The Railway Children*, though perhaps less so for the literary and political criticism she published in the 1890s. This new catalogue can hopefully contribute to wider efforts to include New Women and their works in the Victorian canon, so that they can be deservedly studied as a literary movement in their own right.
